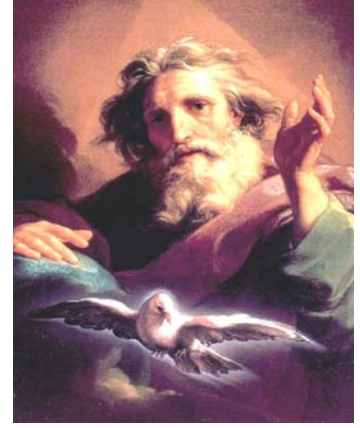

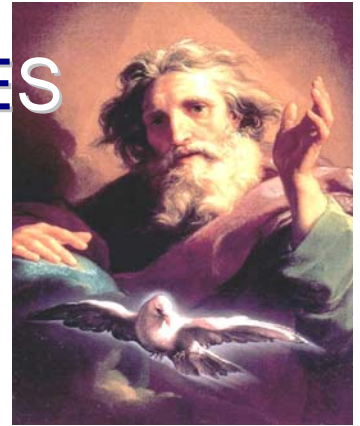

The following are NOT members of the Apostolic College (not of the 13):

- **Stephen**, who was the first martyr of the Church, was a Deacon of the early Church.
- **Luke** was a companion to Paul, and writer of the Gospel.
- **Mark** (actually John Mark) was Peter's secretary and later a companion to Paul, after which he died a martyr in Egypt. He wrote the first Gospel, while working for Peter.
- **James**, who wrote one of the New Testament books (Letter bearing his name) is James the Righteous, who led the early church in Jerusalem as bishop (head of elders) for more than 30 years and was known as the "brother of Jesus", which means he could have been a close relative, such as nephew, cousin or half-brother (perhaps Joseph was a widower, when he married the Virgin Mary, and James was his son. It's interesting to note that James was not a follower of Jesus until after His resurrection, which is why his presence was not noted at the crucifixion. He is the James mentioned in the Acts of the Apostles and by Paul. He was martyred in Jerusalem in A.D.62 at more than 80 years old, almost exactly 30 years to the day of the death of Jesus, being stoned & beaten by a mob, who were followers of the Jewish leaders. He was finally killed by one of the mob, who had something like a sledge hammer and brought it down on James head, in front of thousands. The leaders put him in front of the throng of people to denounce Jesus; but James told them the truth. James the Righteous is considered the greatest of the three James.
- The Letter of Jude (the next to the last New Testament book) was written by **Jude**, known as the brother to James and Jesus.
- **Paul**, who was originally Saul of Tarsus, was a learned theologian and tent maker. Before becoming a disciple of Christ, he passively stood by and watched as St. Stephen was martyred. He died in A.D.66; beheaded in Rome.
